I saw a lovely female **House Sparrow**. House Sparrows like living alongside people, but they still like wild spaces too.

5. "Chiff Chaff. Chiff Chaff." Although I didn't see it, this bird is easy to learn from its call. The name says it all: **Chiffchaff**.

Keep your eyes and ears open. You never know what birds you'll encounter!

You can start your journey at either end, or the middle of the map. If you don't find all the birds you can always come back and try again.

There were **Moorhens** on my earlier treasure hunt, but now you can search for their babies. There was a cute one in the lily pads.



I saw **Lesser Black-backed Gulls** close to **Firhill Road**. There are 4 different species of gulls common to Glasgow, but Lesser Black-backed is the most noticeable in summer. Watch out for your lunch!

Summer on the canal is a bird bustle. Resident and migratory species have made their nests and are raising babies. This workshop is a treasure hunt between Firhill Road and Ruchill Street, and birds are the treasure!



You might hear fluty, warbling songs made by a **black bird with a yellow beak**. This is the **Blackbird**.
